What -- What -- What could other, 12 um, determinations? 1.3 Beck: Um, it could be -- it could be a preliminary 14 determination, um, which would be really kind of 15 a straightforward decision. It could be an insignificant alteration which would be a little 16 17 bit more technical. Um, and then -- then it 18 would be the formal, um, application which is 19 kind of a -- usually the -- the more difficult 20 sides. 21 Ratigan: Okay. Uh, let's -- just to make sure I've --22 I've got it right. The, uh, the preliminary 23 application is basically, uh, where a, um, 24 developer or applicant, uh, writes to your

agency and says, "Hey, I wanna build here. Uh,
do I even need to file an application?" Is that

Beck: Primarily there's another one where they can ask for a jurisdictional decision.

Ratigan: Okay.

Beck: But typically if they think -- if they think they're close and they need to get in, they're gonna need to get a permit, they'll submit to the preliminary determination.

Ratigan: Okay.

Beck: And then the decisions will be based on that, which is kind of like a lighter application and if it's an insignificant alteration, then they can go right to that step and issue. I -- I believe they go right to that step and issue a permit called an insignificant alteration. If it's gonna be a significant alteration, they have to go through -- they send a letter saying it's gonna be a formal application and they need more information. There's more to the application.

Ratigan: Okay. And so if -- if it's a, uh, insignificant alteration that probably does not reach your

Do you have any 12 knowledge that Anthony Silva is the person 13 trying to do this? 14 Beck: I don't -- I don't think so at that time. 15 Ratigan: Okay. Uh, in the first round, I -- I think that was my 16 Beck: 17 -- I think that was my first exposure to as far 18 as I can remember. And certainly again, it was 19 under Mooney. Um, and I think that the only --2.0 the -- the first time, well, I'm sure you'll get 2.1 to it, but I -- I believe the first time that I 22 knew, uh, or even saw the name I'll have to 23 remember was, um, an email that, um, that, uh --24 and you probably have it. It was an email that

Beck: 5 Yeah, I follow. 6 Ratigan: But wait, I assume you -- so you're sitting down 7 we're -- we're saying this is a significant, uh, 8 alteration and, um, what's -- how does that 9 conversation go? How -- How does that 10 discussion go? 11 Beck: So we -- Um, sitting in my office basically 12 he'll bring the file in with him and it was 13 really to review, you know, they've -- they've 14 pretty much already done their work and -- and prepared their decision, but we have the public 15 16 notice comments. So he wanted to -- And -- And 17 a lot of times those don't even the public 18 notice might not create any more, um, concern or 19 anything like that. But in this one, he said, 20 "We got, um, you know, it's obviously it's a 21 tough -- a tough site, um, single-family homes, 22 you know, infill lots." We see -- We see these a 23 lot. Um, and some of them are tough because of 24 the situation, but, um, we have guidance on how

to avoid and reduce the impacts. So anyway, he received a number of comments from the public.

Um, so he wanted to go through those comments with me and so we would just run through what types of comments they received, and then he would have to make a decision as to when it -- whether or not any of them were substantive.

I'm sure you've heard that mail phrase, um, so far.

Ratigan: Yeah, I -- I'm working on my pronunciation. I
- I struggle with --

So -- So he, um, he basically ran through the, uh, comments with me and in essence, um, showed me, I guess there were photographs and, um -- um, comments about the impacts to biology which he didn't think were significant comments. Um, you know, they were, um, pictures of deer and things like that. And there's a lot of habitat in the area. Um, so he said, "I don't think that those are -- are substantive comments." And I -- you know, defer to him on the biology stuff, you know, almost 100% of the time, um, because he's a biologist and he's been doing it for a long time and I'm an engineer.

Ratigan: Right.

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2 So it's not my specialty. Um, but he did say 3 that he, um, that the comments that he got a set 4 of comments that were brief from the town. 5 planner. And so he -- he said, "I -- You know, they're -- they're very generic. 6 I don't know 7 what to make of 'em. They're not -- You know, I 8 -- I don't think they're substantive." Um, but 9 you know, they're raising an issue and we talked 10 about it and I said, "Well, you know, we -- we need to defer to the town. You know, we need to 11 12 respect that, um, that they've made that 1.3 It's unfortunate that it's such a 14 broad comment but we should -- we should call 15 them substantive and -- and defer to them." So that would've, uh, required -- So then we have 16 17 to send out, Sam (ph) you have to have a public 18 hearing. And we'll hear everybody's side of the 19 story and then we'll make a decision.

Ratigan: Okay. So --

Beck: That was the nature of the meeting.

Ratigan: All right. So that -- that notice goes out through, um, Marty's people or through Mar- -- through Marty, I think.

Yeah, they do have public, uh -- they do a --1 Beck: 2 they sent a letter basically telling people what 3 their options are under the regs. So we've got 4 comments, we've deemed them to be substantive 5 here are your options under the regulations. 6 Ratigan: Yeah. 7 Beck: And part of one of those is to, um, pay a fee to 8 have, uh, a public hearing. Then that public 9 hearing is, um, done by the program, by the --10 by the office of water resources. 11 Ratigan: Okay. 12 Beck: And the hearing officer would either -- would 1.3 probably be Marty or myself. 14 Ratigan: Okay. 15 Beck: Um, I've never -- There hasn't been one since 16 I've been in my position. And Marty said I 17 think he only remembers two in his 40-year 18 career. 19 Ratigan: And -- And -- And why is it that there, uh, 20 usually are not public hearings? 21 Beck: Um, probably they don't usually get there, I 22 think. You know, usually between the -- And 2.3 that's actually a good question but I think it's

1 the upfront work that we do with applicants 2 either through pre-application meetings or our 3 quidance. Um, you know, most, um, applicants are able to account for that early on in their 4 5 project so they don't get to that point where there are objections or substantive comments. 6 7 Ratigan: So -- So they -- they address the issues, um, 8 before they get to the end of the road you said? 9 Beck: Yeah, I think usually through that coordination 10 step where, you know, they can say what they 11 wanna do and we'd say, "Yeah, dude, you know, 12 try to minimize this, try to minimize that, you 13 know, here's how you can avoid and reduce." Um, 14 for residential property, single-family 15 residence we actually have a 12-page guidance 16 document that tells people how they can -- how 17 they can achieve that. So like I said most of 18 'em, I -- my guess is that they just don't get 19 to that point.

Ratigan: Okay. Um, so what -- what's your -- what's your next interaction? After you're meeting with Marty, you know, they're gonna send out the, uh, the notice that it's substantive and, uh, there's ne- -- the necessity of a public

2 Yeah, I was just thinking about my next Beck: 3 interaction was I think -- I think it was, um, 4 geez, it might have been from AAD or admin --5 adjudicated, and I'll struggle with that pronunciation or, uh, hearing officer, which is 6 7 a totally different unit. Um, I -- I think 8 that's when I heard -- they had submitted some -9 - a hearing request to them and they had no idea 10 You know, they were kind of blindsided. why. "Like what the heck?" You know, this isn't an 11 12 appeal of a permit. This is a more of a 1.3 regulatory hearing done by the program. So they 14 had actually, somehow the request did come in 15 with a -- with a check I think to -- to our 16 front desk. Now keep in mind. I think this is 17 when we're -- we're kind of exiting the office 18 in waves, um, because of COVID so all my, um, 19 staff we're -- we're almost 100% remote for a 20 little while except for a few people, um, and I 21 think Ron Gagnon (ph) and OCTA the front door, 2.2 so to speak was one of those. And he -- I -- I 23 -- I believe he received the, um, the 24 application directed it to -- to somebody,

processed the check and sent that onto AAD as well. So I think it was Mary Dalton (ph), um, sent out an email, um, saying what -- what's going on here. So I think that's when I got involved going. I think they're in the wrong place, you know, in terms of who they sent the check to and who they're request -- requesting the hearing from. Um, so that I think was my first interaction after that. So then it was, um, I believe I got an email, uh, from Terry saying, um, what was it? Like "What's -- what's happening with this -- this?" You know, and I said, "Well, I think, you know, they -- I -- I think the applicant was contacting him and asking him a question about what's -- you know, how do I navigate through this process?" And I said, "Well, I'm gonna have to figure this out a little bit, but why don't you have them just reach out to me and I can keep them informed."

And I didn't even have a platform to do that at the time. didn't have a license for Zoom which eventually

Um, it was primarily, uh, timing, you know, um, and I think -- I'm trying to remember 'cause I think it's important and I'm not sure which conversation. So I think I only talked to him on the phone then, but again, you'd have to look at the timeline. I know I had a conversation at one point probably is in relation to this telephone call. And one of the things that he -- he went out of his way to, you know, give me, you know, his story, you know, at which I was like, "I don't really care what your story is." But, you know, so he's like, "Well, you know, I was, uh, the Chief of Police in Cumberland for 20 years or, um, pa pum pa," and literally I -- I mean, and I kind of -- it doesn't mean anything to me, but I kind of appreciated the fact that he said, "I'm not looking for anything. It's just a project that my son and I are working on. We just wanna get through the process." You know, he -- he -- he kind of went over to try to make it clear that, you know, he wasn't asking for

favors. Um, for what it's worth, right? I mean, but I was like, "Okay." So that was like a yep -- yep -- yep. Okay, let's just figure out how to get through this thing, you know.

Ratigan: Did he indicate, you know, what his -- what his concerns were? What his difficulties were?

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Beck:

They don't have an easement, you know, a lot of times. So they kinda like the fact that the -- some of these infill lots aren't developed either 'cause they're to getting taxes from somebody then using it as a -

Ratigan: Right. And if -- if all the neighbors are

complaining about the flooding in the area, the last thing they wanna do is let someone build and --

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And -- And I've worked with Cum- -- and Right. the way I say that I've been working with Cumberland for a long time on drainage issues because they just do a very poor job at the local level, um, of managing their own road drainage. Their own -- So with this lot, they literally had a drainage pipe that ran through the lot and they had an easement. So, you know, I believe probably part of the flooding is that they never maintained that pipe ever. didn't even know where the end of it was. was buried in the marsh, you know, or the wetland. So, you know, I -- Again, it -- it's kinda like, you know, if they really wanted to solve the problem, they'd do their due diligence and -- and correct it. Um, so the -- the -- the test for us was, um, not only you can't make it worse, you know, with what you do, but is there -- are there things that you can do to make it better? And a lot of times those problems are solved through negotiation at the local level

between the applicant and the town. So they --The town may say, "Look, if you wanna -- You know, if you wanna get our permit clean out -clean out our pipe and maintain it for us, or put in a new one on your dime." And that's how the town is 'cause they don't have the funding that -- to obviously to do it in the first So anyway, that was my hope that, you know, he could go back, work with the town, figure out what the drainage issue is, providing en- -- engineering solution, um, to the extent that was necessary 'cause really we're -- what -- weren't quite sure. In my first look at it, I wasn't quite sure that it was a truly valid comment from the co- -- town of Cumberland, but due deference, you know, I mean I'm -- I would rather err on the side of deferring to the town's concerns to -- and then to move forward. So that's why I agreed with Marty that we should call it substantive, at least the drainage issue until we can figure out if we can solve it.

Uh, if I'm misinterpreting it, but Marty Moreira: 8 seemed to have some strong feelings about, uh, the 9 town drainage and --10 Beck: Right. 11 Moreira: It should be resolved. Right? 12 Beck: Yeah. 13 Moreira: Do you remember talking with him about, what he raises 14 in here after getting this email? 15 Beck: This is February? Yeah. You know, where, and Cumberland's pretty famous for not taking responsibility for pipes in their streets or their drainage systems. Um, I, again, I've been up specifically dealing with situations where they've recreated a street and just shot the water right down into somebody's property. We get the calls, I go up there and, and it was something that they did. Um, they don't wanna take responsibility for it. Um, and then sometimes it's as simple -- So one point I'm up there for three months trying to figure out a problem the neighbours are complaining and it turns out it was something that the town did. They've got a machine

right there and they, and, and the fix was adding a berm and maybe putting one catch base in it. And it took me three months to work through those issues with them because that's again. So just giving you the landscape, the town, um, it's not unusual for them to, to, to not maintain or know where their pipes are, but that being said, um, that wasn't really the, the point of the question. The -- I think your question really came down to, um, Marty had raised an issue about a culvert under the road.

almost like belt and suspenders almost, right? It's, it's two systems, one on top of the other, if the street system, doesn't work and it doesn't go through the pipe, it's gonna go through that swell and be safely conveyed, the flood, the flood's storm.

I wouldn't want it to, uh, change their 5 answer. You know, their answer should always be the 6 same regardless.
